#### **Turkey Point Teen Publishes Picture Book**





A call to 911 brought two officers in short order and the individual was escorted off the island. Shortly thereafter two young islanders were seen playing on the pier. #### Flu Season is Now

The Anne Arundel County Department I of Health's immunization program to provide free seasonal flu vaccines to county residents began in October. Note that this program is for vaccinations for the annual strain (not Swine flu) that the Center for Communicable Disease (CCD) suggests on an annual basis. Flu vaccinations are free to county residents; however, a \$20 donation is appreciated. Medicare Part B will cover the

\$20 donation if residents bring their Medicare cards. Information about clinic dates and locations is available by



calling **410-222-7343** or visiting the web site at www.aahealth.org

Dates are uncertain as to when the H1N1 vaccine will be available to all Marylanders. State health officials have announced that they are planning to administer it in three phases at more than 2,000 sites. Five manufacturers have been working on a vaccine, which will be distributed by the federal government. It is expected to be sent to states in

weekly shipments and, although no firm date has been given, available in November.

#### FYI—Cell Phone Numbers Go Public

Tell phone numbers are going public. Soon, if not already, cell phone numbers are being released to telemarketing compa-✓nies and you will start to receive sales calls. You can expect to be charged for these calls. Even if the message is not

> answered but is saved on your phone, you will be charged for the minutes to listen to it. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) is the Nation's consumer protection agency. They have established a telephone line and an Internet site for consumers to use to register their cell phones on the FTC "Do Not Call" list. There is no cost to you to register.

To register your phone number, dial (using your cell phone) **1-888-382-1222**. You must use the phone with the number you want blocked to make this call. Online, go to www.ftc.gov/donotcall. When registering online you will be required to respond to a confirmation email before registration will become valid.

Telemarketers have up to 31 days from the date you register to stop calling you. Your cell phone number will remain on this list for five years.

The FTC has specific steps consumers should take if they have put their phones on the National Do Not Call Registry and they are called by telemarketers. Information about what constitutes a violation and specifics about how to file a complaint are available at the **www.ftc.gov/donotcall** site. See "How to Make A Telemarketing Complaint" for complete information.

#### Census 2010 is Coming

The U.S. Constitution requires the count of people living in the country every 10 years, regardless of their citizenship status. Early next year the U. S. Census Bureau will be sending out a 10question form to every household in the United States. Clout in Congress and billions in future federal dollars ride on the once-a-decade head count. In the 2000 count, 69 percent of Marylanders returned census questionnaires by mail or submitted information in another form, over the phone or by Internet. The nation averaged a 67 percent response rate.

The 2010 census timeline calls for questionnaires to be

#### mailed in February 2010. April 1, 2010 will be Census Day. Between April and July 2010 census takers will

visit households that did not mail in their questionnaires. In December 2010 the Census Bureau will deliver population counts to the president. Finally, in March 2011 the Census Bureau is scheduled to complete delivery of redistricting data to states.

Per the U.S. Constitution, each U.S. House district has roughly the same number of people. The census is used to determine how many representatives each state will have. The 2010 census will be interesting in that states like Minnesota, Massachusetts and New York, as well as a handful of others, face the possibility of losing seats in the 435-member House to faster-growing states

in the South and West.
